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The Restoration Plea has been taught in our land for two centuries now, yet many in this generation have not heard it. It says:

Let us speak where the Bible speaks and be silent where the Bible is silent. Let us call Bible things by Bible names and do Bible things in Bible ways. Let's restore the church as it was in the days of the apostles.

When one speaks of a restoration plea, four things are implied.

THE RESTORATION PLEA **IMPLIES THAT GOD HAD A PLAN** FOR THE CHURCH.

In the basement of America's largest home, the Biltmore mansion in Asheville, North Carolina, there is a model of the structure. The model was completed first as a guide to build the home. In Barcelona, Spain, you can visit the still unfinished Sagrada Familia Church. They have been working on it for fifty years. They have a model of what the building will look like when it is finished.

The restoration plea implies that God had a plan for the church, which He revealed to man (Isaiah 2:2-4; Daniel 2:44; Ephesians 3:10-11).

God has always had a pattern.

- Noah's ark (Genesis 6:22; 7:5);
- Tabernacle (Exodus 25:8–9);
- Temple (1 Chronicles 28:11–19);
- Jericho's walls (Joshua 6; Hebrews 11:30);
- Naaman's cleansing (2 Kings 5:1-14).

Isaiah prophesied of the coming kingdom, showing that God was already making plans for the church seven centuries before it came to be (Isaiah 2:2-4). Isaiah said God would "teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths." Jesus sent out the apostles to teach those paths (Mark 16:15-16). Since the early church "continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine" (Acts 2:42; cf. 4:32), we know God's messengers got His plan for the church delivered to the early Christians. Just as the fullness of God is in Christ (Colossians 1:19; 2:9) and God has >>

no plans for salvation for the world outside of Christ (John 14:6; Acts 4:12), so the church is the fullness of Christ, and Christ has no plans for the world outside of His church (Ephesians 3:21).

THE RESTORATION PLEA IMPLIES THAT GOD EXPECTS US TO CONTINUE TO FOLLOW HIS PLAN.

The restoration plea implies that God expects us to continue to follow His plan in each succeeding generation. Paul wrote, "The things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also" (2 Timothy 2:2). God wanted His pattern followed century after century.

The Bible emphasizes patterns. In constructing the tabernacle, Moses was warned by God that he must "make all things according to the pattern" (Exodus 25:40; Hebrews 8:5). Paul spoke of the "pattern of sound words" (2 Timothy 1:13 Asv) which early Christians were taught and in which they were to abide (2 Timothy 3:14). These Christians obeyed a "form" of doctrine (Romans 6:17-18) and "marked" (were on the lookout for) those who departed from that pattern (Romans 16:17). When it came to the doctrine of the New Testament, they earnestly contended for the faith (Jude 3), were warned about falling away from the faith (cf. 2 Thessalonians 2:3; 1 Timothy 4:1-3; 2 Timothy 4:1-4), and not to go "beyond the things which are written" (1 Corinthians 4:6 Asv). Each generation was charged not to teach a "different

doctrine" (1 Timothy 1:3 Asv). Warnings not to go beyond the teaching of Christ abound in the New Testament (Galatians 1:6–9; Matthew 15:13; 2 Corinthians 11:3; Revelation

22:18–19). John said explicitly:

Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son. If there come any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him God speed: for he that biddeth him God speed is partaker of his evil deeds (2 John 1:9–11).

THE RESTORATION PLEA IMPLIES THAT MAN LEFT GOD'S PATTERN.

By becoming too well known, a product can lose its distinctiveness. The Trademark Association calls this problem "genericide." Marlin Connelly gives some examples:

All facial tissue is called Kleenex, Any gelatin dessert is Jello, Any clear, sticky tape is Scotch Tape, Any carbonated drink is a Coke (at least in the South),

Any adhesive bandage is a Band-Aid.

This has happened to the words *Christian* and *Christianity*. Once brand names for a definite product, they are now used for any kind of vague religiosity connected loosely with the historical Christ. In the minds of some, the rigid New Testament ethical code is now fluid and accommodating. Doctrines that in Bible times were black and white are now gray and faded. Practices that were then commanded are now optional. For instance, the creed book of the largest Protestant denomination states:

It is most likely that in the Apostolic age when there was but "one Lord, one faith, and one baptism," and no differing denominations existed, the baptism of a convert by that very act constituted him a member of the church, and at once endowed him with all the rights and privileges of full membership. In that sense, "baptism was the door into the church." Now, it is different.

Why is it different today? God has not changed His mind. Men have usurped authority not belonging to them and changed God's church into something different from what He intended. Surely God wants us to return to His original vision for the church.

THE RESTORATION PLEA IMPLIES THAT GOD WANTS HIS PEOPLE TO RESTORE HIS ORIGINAL PATTERN TODAY.

In the long ago, God's prophet urged, as we do today, "Stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where is the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls" (Jeremiah 6:16). Let's go out among our neighbors with an open Bible and call them back to these old paths. *

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You Could Have Done That

Carol Bartz is the CEO (Chief

Executive Officer) of Yahoo. In a recent interview at a Forum at Georgia State University, she was asked what was the best advice she had been given.

She said it came from her grandmother who raised her on a farm in Minnesota. "I was in the machine shed with my brother. We heard a rattlesnake above us and ran for Grandma. She grabbed a shovel, knocked the snake out of the rafters and chopped its head off. Then she said, 'You could have done that.' And you know what? She was right."

That got me to thinking about what I could have done. Several years ago while preaching for a church in Flint, Michigian, we had a school of preaching. One instructor taught Greek. I signed up to take the course, went three days, and quit. But I could have done that. Here are some ideas.

(1) Read through the Bible (or the New Testament) in a year. Recently while in Gatlinburg I noticed in the church bulletin the names of those who had already completed reading through the Bible. While in Gainesville, Florida, I noticed on the board that 19 had completed reading through the Bible. You could do that.

(2) Read a set of commentaries. A brother in the Jacksonville, Alabama, congregation told me that within a year and a half after he obeyed the gospel he had read the complete set of New Testament Commentaries by Burton Coffman. Do you think he knew a little bit more about the Bible after that? You could do that.

(3) A good lady with whom I am acquainted bakes small pound cakes and gives them to the sick. You could do that.

(4) I knew a lady confined to a wheelchair who regularly sent cards of encouragement to the sick and shut in, elders, and members who needed lifting up. You could do that.



All Things CONSIDERED Filled with Contradictions?



Many claim the Bible is filled with contradictions. This claim is most often made by those who have little or no knowledge of the Bible. As might be expected of any literary work, the Bible contains apparent contradictions, that is, passages that seem to be contradictory, but which are not when properly understood.

A difference is not a contradiction. Aristotle defined contradiction: That the same thing should at the same time both be and not be for the same person and in the same respect is impossible.

A difference is not a contradiction if the same person was not under consideration, or if the same time period was not used for both, or if the language was not employed in the same sense.

Proverbs 26:4-5 demonstrates the principle. It gives the advice, Answer not a fool according to his folly, lest thou also be like unto him. Answer a fool according to his folly, lest he be wise in his own conceit. Is this a contradiction, since one verse says not to answer a fool, and the very next verse says to answer a fool? Not at all. What Solomon was saying with these verses, in the midst of a series of verses dealing with fools, was that sometimes it is better not to even answer a fool, lest one appear to be just as big a fool for answering. But sometimes the fool must be answered so that he will not think he is so wise that he cannot be answered. Solomon was saying, it will be difficult to deal with a fool!

Because Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John all wrote about the events of the life of Christ, there are differences among their accounts. For example, Mark says that Jesus was crucified at the third hour (Mark 15:25), while John says that Jesus was on trial before Pilate at the sixth hour (John 19:14). Thus it would appear that either John or Mark is wrong, because John has Jesus on trial three hours after Mark says He was on the cross. But when one understands that John must have used Roman time, with the sixth hour being 6:00 a.m., while Mark used Jewish time, with the third hour being 9:00 a.m., then the apparent contradiction disappears.

Many other alleged discrepancies can be found, but as long as there is a logical way to explain the differences, then the truthfulness of the Bible stands. If we approach the Bible with an open mind and a willingness to accept its truth, we can understand.

Many find errors in it because they do not approach it openly and honestly. God has communicated His will to us through the Bible. He expects us to understand and obey what it teaches. God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all churches of the saints (1 Corinthians 14:33).

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Things the Church of Christ Will Never Do

The church of Christ wants to be a people who carefully follow God's Book for we know that only in that way can we honor the Lord and be pleasing in His sight (Revelation 22:14). With that in mind, there are some things that Christ's true church will never do.

(1) The church of Christ will never tell you that man's way is as good as God's way. God's way is always best, every time! His wisdom is far greater than man's (1 Corinthians 1:25).

(2) The church of Christ will never tell you that God accepts every kind of worship, so it does not matter how one worships. Jesus said that we must worship the Father in spirit and in truth (John 4:23–24). Several Old Testament examples remind us that some worship does not please Jehovah (for instance, Cain's worship, Genesis 4; see also Leviticus 10).

(3) The church of Christ will never tell you that since God is loving, we all have the right to live any way that we want. God is love (1 John 4:8), but the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God (1 Corinthians 6:9-11). God is gracious, but He still expects us to practice self-control (Galatians 5:22-23).

(4) The church of Christ will never make light of trying to do exactly what God tells us to do in the Bible. The Lord wants us to obey Him (Luke 6:46). Jesus said, "If ye love me, keep my commandments" (John 14:15).

(5) The church of Christ will never tell you that the way to receive the forgiveness of sins is to pray "The Sinner's Prayer." This is true because the Bible does not give this as the way salvation. The book of Acts records the history and doctrine of the early church, and contains pattern cases of conversion. It records the conversions of thousands of people, yet no one was ever told to pray to get into the Christ. Instead, they heard, believed, and obeyed the gospel (Acts 2:38; 18:8, etc). That is what we intend to tell the people of our generation as well.

a young man was flown into the desolate north country of Alaska to photograph the natural beauty and mysteries of the tundra. As the months passed, the entries in his diary, which at first detailed his wonder and fascination with the wildlife around him, turned into a pathetic record of a nightmare.



In August he wrote, "I think I should have used more foresight about arranging my departure. I'll soon find out." He waited and waited, but no one came to his rescue.

In November he died in a nameless valley, by a nameless lake, 225 miles northeast of Fairbanks. An investigation revealed that he had carefully mapped out his venture, but had made no provision to be flown out of the area.

All of us need to make specific plans for our departure from this life. If we don't, we can be left in a predicament worse than that young man!
