Salvation: Confession (Romans 10:9-10)

Introduction:

- 1. During His ministry Jesus showed that a person's soul is his most valuable possession.
- 2. He made this point on one occasion by asking two questions (Matthew 16:26).
- 3. Because our souls are so valuable we must give careful attention to saving them.
- 4. For several weeks we have been studying some important Bible subjects that relate to "the salvation of our souls," including:
 - a. the grace of God
 - b. the death of Christ
 - c. hearing God's Word
 - d. believing that Jesus is the Son of God
 - e. repentance.
- 5. We have shown how these subjects relate to those who desire to be saved as well as to those who have been saved.
- 6. In this lesson we are examining passages that relate to "confession."
- 7. The first point we need to make is that . . .

Discussion:

I. "CONFESSION" IS A KEY COMPONENT OF THE PLAN OF SALVATION

- A. Some important details relating to confession are revealed in Romans 10:9-10.
 - 1. The means of confession is "with the mouth."
 - a. This implies that a statement is made.
 - b. The statement made with the mouth reveals something that is believed in the heart.
 - 2. The content of confession is "the Lord Jesus."
 - a. The person making the confession must believe in his heart that God raised Jesus from the dead.
 - b. This is important because Jesus was *"declared to be the Son of God with power"* by His resurrection from the dead (Romans 1:4).
 - 3. The purpose of confession us "unto salvation."
 - a. Confession is an essential part of the plan of salvation.
 - b. However, the plan of salvation does not only consist of believing and confessing that Jesus is God's Son.
 - c. Repentance and baptism are also required (Acts 2:38).
 - B. The conversion of the eunuch illustrates how confession relates to salvation (Acts 8:35-38).
 - C. These passages clearly teach that "confession" is a part of the Lord's plan of salvation; however, . . .
- II. "CONFESSIONS" ARE ALSO REQUIRED OF CHRISTIANS [Those who have been saved]
 - A. Those who have been saved must continue to confess Christ.
 - 1. We must confess Christ before men so He will confess us before the Father (Matthew 10:32-33).
 - 2. Hindrances to confessing Christ include:
 - a. fear (John 9:18-23)
 - b. love for the praise of men (John 12:42-43).
 - 3. According to 1 John 4:15, confessing Jesus as God's Son shows that God dwells in us and that we dwell in God.
 - B. Those who have been saved must confess their sins.
 - 1. Some important principles are revealed in Proverbs 28:13.
 - a. Those who cover up or conceal their sins will not prosper in God's sight.
 - b. Those who confess and forsake their sins will receive mercy.
 - 2. "Healing" is associated with confessing faults to others (James 5:16a).
 - 3. "Forgiveness" is associated with confessing sins to God (1 John 1:8-10).

- C. Finally, let us receive some encouragement from several . . .
- III. BIBLE CHARACTERS WHO CONFESSED THEIR FAITH IN GOD THROUGH THEIR ACTIONS
 - A. Joseph abstained from committing adultery (Genesis 39:7-12).
 - B. David accepted Goliath's challenge (1 Samuel 17:44-48).
 - C. Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego refused to bow before Nebuchadnezzar's image of gold (Daniel 3:14-18).
 - D. Daniel prayed, even though it was illegal (Daniel 6:6-10).
 - E. Stephen looked to Jesus as he was killed and prayed for his enemies (Acts 7:54-60).
 - F. Paul and Silas prayed and sang praises in prison (Acts 16:22-25).
