## The Day of the Lord (2 Peter 3:10)

## Introduction:

- 1. In the Bible we read about many important days, such as:
  - a. the days of Creation (Genesis 1)
  - b. the Day of Atonement, observed on the 10<sup>th</sup> day of the 7<sup>th</sup> month (Leviticus 23:27)
  - c. the day of Pentecost (Acts 2)
  - d. the Lord's Day, the 1<sup>st</sup> day of the week (Revelation 1:10)
  - e. the day of the Lord (2 Peter 3:10).
- 2. In our lesson we are concentrating on the day mentioned in 2 Peter 3:10.
- 3. According to this verse, on this day "the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up."
- 4. Many people thought that these events would occur last Friday (12/21/12).
- 5. The fact that the world did not come to an end indicates that there is a need to study passages that relate to "the day of the Lord."

## Discussion:

- I. THE BIBLE EXPLAINS HOW THE DAY OF THE LORD WILL ARRIVE
  - A. Peter stated that "the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night."
  - B. The same point is made in 1 Thessalonians 5:2.
  - C. This expression simply means that the time of the Lord's return is unknown, as stated in Revelation 3:3.
  - D. Because we do not know exactly when the day of the Lord will arrive, we must not be deceived into thinking that He will not return.
    - 1. Peter warned against this in 2 Peter 3:3-4.
    - 2. In John 14:2-3 Jesus said that He will return.
    - 3. We learn from Acts 17:30-31 that God has "appointed a day" when His Son will return in judgment.
  - E. Many attempts have been made to predict when Jesus will return, but the day of the Lord will arrive "as a thief in the night."
- II. JESUS GAVE INSTRUCTIONS THAT ARE BASED ON THE WAY THIS DAY WILL ARRIVE
  - A. Matthew 24:36-41
    - 1. Jesus first stated that no man or angel knows when He will return.
    - 2. He compared His return to the flood in Noah's day.
      - a. God had said He would destroy the earth with a flood.
      - b. Unfortunately, no one outside of Noah's family was prepared for the flood.
    - 3. Jesus explained that a separation will take place when He returns.
  - B. Matthew 24:42-43
    - 1. Jesus taught His followers to "watch" for His return.
    - 2. He used a thief breaking into a house to illustrate the importance of watching.
  - C. Matthew 24:44-51
    - 1. Jesus taught His followers to "be ready" for His return.
    - 2. He contrasted 2 servants to illustrate the importance of being ready.
  - D. Matthew 25:1-13
    - 1. These verses record "the parable of the virgins."
    - 2. Jesus used this parable to illustrate the importance of watching and being ready for His return.
- III. ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTIONS ARE GIVEN IN 2 PETER 3
  - A. (vs.11-12) Looking forward to the Lord's return should affect the way we live.
    - 1. Our "conversation" is to be "holy."
    - 2. We are to pursue "godliness."

- B. (vs.13) We are to look forward to a new dwelling place that God has promised.
- C. (vs.14) Looking forward to this should lead us to be diligent so we can be in good standing with the Lord.

## Conclusion:

- 1. When the end of the world was discussed recently, Scripture was left out.
- 2. Let us always remember the admonition given in 2 Peter 3:1-2.
