Let Us Do Good Unto All Men (Galatians 6:9-10)

Introduction:

- 1. The letter known as Galatians was written to "the churches [congregations] of Galatia" (1:2).
- 2. This letter contains a great amount of valuable information.
 - a. It shows how we are no longer under the Law of Moses (3:23-25; 5:4).
 - b. It reveals the one way for all people to get into Christ (3:26-28).
 - c. It also contains a number of responsibilities that the Lord has given to His people.
- 3. One responsibility is given in 6:9-10 -- "let us do good unto all men."
- 4. In our lesson we are concentrating on this responsibility.
- 5. We are basing our main points on the statements made in these verses.
- 6. Let us first consider some . . .

Discussion:

- I. GENERAL PRINCIPLES THAT RELATE TO DOING GOOD WORKS
 - A. Jesus was devoted to doing good deeds for others -- Peter said that He "went about doing good" (Acts 10:38).
 - B. Jesus taught His followers to do good deeds for others.
 - 1. He gave the second commandment in Matthew 22:39 -- "love thy neighbor as thyself."
 - 2. He illustrated what this commandment involves in the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:33-37).
 - C. (Ephesians 2:8-10) When we are saved we are created unto good works, and we are to walk in them
 - D. (Titus 2:11-14) The Lord wants His people to be "zealous of good works."
 - E. With these principles in mind, let us turn our attention to . . .
- II. THE STATEMENTS MADE IN GALATIANS 6:9-10
 - A. (vs.9a) "And let us not be weary in well doing."
 - 1. A similar statement is found in 2 Thessalonians 3:13.
 - 2. We have shown how Christians are to continually do good works.
 - 3. According to Titus 3, we are to maintain good works because:
 - a. they are "good and profitable unto men" (vs.8)
 - b. they will prevent us from being unfruitful (vs.14).
 - 4. Activity can cause us to become tired, and sometimes our efforts will not be appreciated, but we must never become weary in doing good deeds.
 - 5. One reason why we must not become weary is that . . .
 - B. (vs.9b) "In due season we shall reap, if we faint not."
 - 1. God does not forget the good deeds done by His children (Hebrews 6:10).
 - 2. (Matthew 25:34-40, 46b) Jesus showed how our good deeds will be remembered at the judgment.
 - 3. Receiving a great reward at the judgment should motivate us to practice the admonition given in . . .
 - C. (vs.10) "As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith."
 - 1. (John 9:3-4) Jesus considered a man's blindness to be an opportunity to do the work that God had given Him to do.
 - 2. (Acts 3:1-11) Peter and John considered a man's lameness to be an opportunity to do the work they had been given to do.
 - a. Doing a good deed does not have to cost anything -- they had no silver or gold.
 - b. By doing this good deed they were given an opportunity to preach to a great crowd (vs.12).

Conclusion:

- 1. From the verses we have studied, the lesson for us to learn is: "Let us do good unto all men"
- 2. Let us remember that doing a good deed for someone might open the door for saving that person's soul.
