Repentance

(Mark 2:17)

Introduction:

- 1. In a number of passages Jesus revealed why He came to earth.
- 2. Mark 2:17 is one such passage -- He came to call sinners to repentance.
- 3. Perhaps this will help us understand why Jesus began His ministry by calling upon people to repent (Mark 1:14-15).
- 4. Since Jesus considered repentance to be so important, this is the subject we are studying in our lesson.
- 5. Let us begin by examining . . .

Discussion:

- I. LUKE 13:1-5
 - A. (vs.1) The Setting: Some people told Jesus about a tragedy that had occurred.
 - 1. Pilate had mingled the blood of some people from Galilee with their sacrifices.
 - 2. Pilate was the governor of Judea, and the ruler of Galilee was Herod.
 - 3. (Luke 23:12) Before Jesus was crucified these men were enemies.
 - 4. It seems that certain people went from Galilee to Jerusalem to worship.
 - 5. While they offered their sacrifices, Pilate had them killed.
 - 6. Jesus was being told about those people from Galilee who had been killed while they were offering their sacrifices.
 - B. (vs.2-5) Jesus corrected a false belief that was quite popular.
 - 1. (vs.2) Jesus asked a question about the Galileans who were killed.
 - a. A popular doctrine was believed which taught that people suffered as a result of their sins (see John 9:1-3).
 - b. Those who held this view would have assumed that the Galileans who died were sinful people who deserved their treatment.
 - c. Those who held this view concluded that those who do not suffer are living pure lives in God's sight.
 - 2. (vs.3) Jesus informed the people who brought up this matter that, if they did not repent of their sins, they would all perish.
 - 3. (vs.4) Jesus continued by asking a question about 18 people who were killed when a tower fell on them.
 - 4. (vs.5) Jesus again told those present that, if they did not repent themselves, they would all perish.
 - C. These statements of Christ show us that:

- 1. He commands us to repent
- 2. those who refuse to repent will suffer eternal destruction.

II. WHAT IS REPENTANCE?

- A. Repent: "to change the mind"
- B. However, the fruit of repentance is a change of life.
 - 1. (Matthew 3:8) John said, "Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance."
 - 2. (Acts 3:19) Peter said, "Repent ye therefore, <u>and be converted</u>, that your sins may be blotted out."
- C. Repentance is much more than being sorry for something we have done -- it is a change of mind that results in a change of life (Matthew 21:28-29).

III. WHO IS REQUIRED TO REPENT?

- A. The Lord wants everyone to repent (2 Peter 3:9).
- B. To be more specific,:
 - 1. non-Christians must repent in order to be saved (Acts 2:38)
 - 2. Christians must repent when we sin (Acts 8:22).

IV. CERTAIN FACTORS SHOULD MOTIVATE US TO REPENT, INCLUDING:

- A. judgment to come (Acts 17:30-31)
- B. the goodness of God (Romans 2:4)
- C. godly sorrow for sin (2 Corinthians 7:10).

Conclusion:

- 1. Jesus came to call sinners to repentance.
- 2. Have you responded to His call? (Matthew 11:28-30)
