## Let Us Learn about God from David (Psalm 139)

## Introduction:

- 1. In the Bible, David is identified several times as "a man after God's own heart" (1 Samuel 13:14; Acts 13:22).
- 2. As we examine David's writings we see why he is identified this way.
- 3. A man after God's own heart can certainly teach us about God.
- 4. In our lesson we are concentrating on David's message in Psalm 139, and as we do so, "let us learn about God from David."

## Discussion:

- I. ACCORDING TO VS.1-6, DAVID UNDERSTOOD THAT GOD IS "ALL KNOWING" [OMNISCIENT]
  - A. In these verses David showed how well God knew him.
    - 1. In vs.1 David indicated that God knew him personally.
    - 2. We learn from vs.2-4 that God knew David's movements, his thoughts, and his words.
    - 3. David showed in vs.5 how God had blessed and influenced him.
    - 4. David was overwhelmed by God's knowledge (vs.6, 17-18).
  - B. Application:
    - 1. The Scriptures teach that God is in heaven (Matthew 6:9).
    - 2. Although God is in heaven, we must not think He is so distant that He cannot see us or He is not aware of our actions (Hebrews 4:13).
    - 3. The fact that God is all knowing and that He knows us personally should lead us to make the request that David made in vs.23-24.
- II. DAVID ALSO UNDERSTOOD IN VS.7-16 THAT GOD IS ALWAYS PRESENT [OMNIPRESENT]
  - A. In these verses David showed that he was always in God's presence.
    - 1. David showed in vs.7-12 that God was always present, regardless of his location and the time of day.
    - 2. David continued in vs.13-16 by stating that he was in God's presence, even while he was in his mother's womb (vs.13-16).
    - 3. David was led to praise God (vs.14a).
  - B. Application:
    - 1. Fleeing from God's presence is impossible (Jonah 1:3; 2:1-2).
    - 2. The Lord will not leave His followers (Hebrews 13:5b).
    - 3. The fact that we are always in God's presence should lead us to make the same request that David made in vs.23-24.
- III. IN VS.19-24 DAVID INDICATED THAT HE WANTED HIS LIFE TO BE RIGHT WITH GOD
  - A. In these verses.:
    - 1. David wanted to avoid wicked people (vs.19-22).
      - a. He realized that God knows the deeds of the wicked and will punish them.
      - b. This led David to consider such people to be his enemies.
    - 2. David asked God to search him, try him, correct him, and lead him (vs.23-24).
  - B. Application:
    - 1. The Lord wants His people to avoid evil associates (1 Corinthians 15:33).
    - 2. The Lord wants His people to examine ourselves (2 Corinthians 13:5a).
    - 3. The Lord judges the hearts of His people (Jeremiah 17:10).

## Conclusion:

- 1. David, a man after God's own heart, has taught us in Psalm 139 that God is all knowing and always present.
- 2. On a regular basis, let us respond to this information about God by making the request that David made in vs.23-24.
