Memorials for God's People (Psalm 135:13)

Introduction:

- 1. In Psalm 135:13 two matters are mentioned in connection with the Lord that are everlasting:
 - a. His name endures forever
 - b. His memorial endures throughout all generations.
- 2. According to the Scriptures, the Lord, whose memorial is everlasting, has established a number of memorials for His people.
- 3. In our lesson we are examining several of these memorials.
- 4. We will see that the Lord has always intended for His people to remember certain things.
- 5. Let us first consider . . .

Discussion:

- I. 4 MEMORIALS THAT THE LORD ESTABLISHED FOR THE ISRAELITES IN THE OLD TESTAMENT
 - A. The Lord established Passover for the Israelites (Exodus 12).
 - 1. After giving instructions about how and when Passover was to be observed (vs.1-13), the Lord stated that it was "a memorial" (vs.14).
 - 2. The Lord wanted His people to remember how He had delivered them from the Egyptians (vs.25-27).
 - B. The Lord established the blowing of trumpets as a memorial for the Israelites (Leviticus 23:23-25).
 - 1. Trumpets were to be blown on the 1st day of the 7th month.
 - 2. That day was observed as a sabbath, and an offering was to be made.
 - C. The Lord established the showbread in the tabernacle as a memorial for the Israelites (Leviticus 24:5-9).
 - D. The Lord established a memorial from 12 stones that were placed where the Israelites crossed the Jordan River (Joshua 4:1-7).
 - E. These memorials, as well as others, were established by the Lord to help His people to remember certain events and to observe holy days.
 - F. Let us turn our attention to . . .
- II. 2 MEMORIALS THAT THE LORD MENTIONED IN THE NEW TESTAMENT
 - A. First, the Lord associated a good deed with a memorial (Mark 14:3-9).
 - 1. Mark did not reveal this woman's identity, but John identified her as Mary, the sister of Martha and Lazarus (John 11:2; 12:1-8).
 - 2. Jesus commended Mary's act of kindness and said that it would "be spoken of her for a memorial of her."
 - 3. See Hebrews 6:10
 - B. Second, the Lord taught that His Supper would be a memorial (Luke 22:19-20).
 - 1. The Lord selected unleavened bread and the fruit of the vine as the elements of His Supper.
 - 2. We learn from Acts 20:7 that the Lord's Supper is to be eaten on the 1st day of the week.
 - 3. The purpose for eating the Lord's Supper is to help us remember what Jesus did on our behalf (1 Corinthians 10:16; 11:23-26).

Conclusion:

- 1. Over the years the Israelites stopped observing their memorials, and they forgot God.
- 2. They paid a high price for their mistakes.
- 3. Let us learn from their mistakes and avoid them.
