Except the Lord Build the House

(Psalm 127:1)

## Introduction:

- 1. Our lesson is based on the statement made in the first part of Psalm 127:1.
- 2. If the Lord is not the builder of a house, those who build it are working in vain.
- 3. As we study this principle, we will examine:
  - a. 2 building projects in the Old Testament
  - b. how the Lord builds His house today.

## Discussion:

- I. TWO BUILDING PROJECTS IN THE OLD TESTAMENT
  - A. The tower of Babel was built in vain (Genesis 11:1-9).
    - 1. (vs.1-4) A plan was made to build a city and a tower.
      - a. Brick and mortar were selected as the materials.
      - b. The plan was to build the tower up to heaven.
      - c. Question: Is there any mention of the Lord in this plan?
        - 1) After the flood God wanted Noah's descendants to populate the earth.
        - 2) The Babel project was designed to keep everyone in that area.
        - 3) This was a vain project because the Lord's will was not followed.
    - 2. (vs.5-9) The Lord stopped this building project.
    - 3. Regardless of how many resources were used, regardless of how many people worked on this project, and regardless of how much time was spent, it was all in vain -- the Lord was not the builder.
  - B. The tabernacle was not built in vain because the Lord built it.
    - 1. The Lord gave Moses a pattern for the tabernacle (Exodus 25:1-9).
      - a. The Lord selected certain materials to be used.
      - b. He gave detailed instructions for building the tabernacle.
    - 2. The Israelites followed the Lord's instructions (Exodus 39:32, 42-43).
    - 3. The Lord was pleased with the tabernacle (Exodus 40:33-34).
  - C. These building projects in the Old Testament illustrate the principle revealed in Psalm 127:1.
  - D. On the basis of this information, let us turn our attention to . . .
  - HOW THE LORD BUILDS HIS HOUSE TODAY
  - A. In 1 Timothy 3:15, the church is identified as God's house.
  - B. God's house:

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- 1. has a corner stone -- Jesus is the corner stone of God's house (Acts 4:11)
- 2. has a foundation -- the apostles and prophets serve as the foundation of God's house (Ephesians 2:19-22)
- 3. has a door
  - a. Jesus is the door of God's house (John 10:9).
  - b. He knocks, and He wants to come in (Revelation 3:20).
- 4. has keys
  - a. Jesus gave the keys of the kingdom to Peter (Matthew 16:19).
  - b. Peter revealed the keys for entering God's house in Acts 2:38.
- 5. is composed of a variety of members
  - a. Christians are the members of God's house (Acts 2:47; 1 Peter 2:5).
  - b. All members of God's house are important (1 Corinthians 12:14-20).
- 6. has something special that binds its members together -- love.
  - a. The hearts of Christians are to be "knit together in love" (Colossians 2:2).
- b. (Colossians 3:14) Christians are to put on love *"which is the bond of perfectness."* Conclusion:
  - 1. Jesus has gone to the Father's house to prepare a place for His followers (John 14:1-4).
    - 2. His faithful followers look forward to spending eternity in that wonderful house (2 Corinthians 5:1-2).
    - 3. Do you have David's confidence of spending eternity in the Lord's house (Psalm 23:6b)?
